Internal Threats Still Plague Cyber Programs

Opening Remarks – United States Attorney, Delaware, Charles M. Oberly, III and Special Agent in Charge Richard A. McFeely

Joint Terrorism Task Forces (JTTFs) are small cells of highly trained, locally based, passionately committed investigators, analysts, linguists, SWAT experts, and other specialists from dozens of U.S. law enforcement and intelligence agencies. It is a multi-agency effort led by the Justice Department and FBI designed to combine the resources of federal, state, and local law enforcement.

"From time to time the Department establishes national investigative and prosecutorial priorities. These priorities are designed to focus Federal law enforcement efforts on those matters within the Federal jurisdiction that are most deserving of Federal attention and are most likely to be handled effectively at the Federal level." [USAM 9-27.230\(B\)\(1\)](#) (comment).

Because of the importance of intellectual property to the national economy and the scale of intellectual property theft, intellectual property crime continues to be a law enforcement priority. Intellectual property theft worldwide reportedly costs American companies \$250 billion a year. U.S. Department of Justice, *Report of the Department of Justice's Task Force on Intellectual Property* 8 (Oct. 2004) (citing Office of the United States Trade Representative). As a consequence, "the American economy is losing hundreds of millions of dollars in tax revenues, wages, investment dollars, as well as hundreds of thousands of jobs." *Id.* The Justice Department has therefore made the enforcement of intellectual property laws a high priority. *Id.* at 13.

To meet this priority, the Department has trained a national network of specialized prosecutors designated "Computer Hacking and Intellectual Property (CHIP) Coordinators," at least one of whom is located in each of the nation's ninety-four United States Attorneys' Offices, with greater numbers in the twenty-five CHIP units located in districts that experience some of the highest concentrations of computer and intellectual property crimes. *See id.* at 13.

DIRECTIONS

Wilmington University: 320 North DuPont Highway, New Castle, DE

The meeting is on the third floor of the Doberstein Admissions Center (DAC) building, Rm. 309. As you turn in the entrance road at the light, it's the brick building on your left. The entrance to the building, elevators, stairs, are on the side that faces away from Rt. 13.

Directions from Wilmington:

Take Rt. 13 South to New Castle. The University is across the street and just before Wilmington Airport and the Rt. 141 overpass. Look for a foot bridge and turn left at the traffic light with the Hess station on the near left corner.

Directions from I-95:

Take Rt. 141 south to Rt. 13 north (interesting how two north/south roads can intersect, no?). Go over the overpass for Rt. 13 and take the cloverleaf exit on the right. Stay in the right lane and turn the light (Hess station on far right corner).

Directions from Southern Delaware:

Take Rt. 1 North to Wilmington. Continue onto Rt. 13 North. Pass the Rt. 273 intersection and Wilmington Airport. Just past the Rt 141 overpass, turn right at the light with the Hess station on the far right corner.
